Many people who participated in the Open House were also part of the Lands and Environment Committee for the Yellowknives Dene.

The Agency and the community had a good discussion about the effects of the mine, the Ekati Expansion Project and planning for closure and reclamation of the mine site.

What the Agency Heard

The Agency heard a lot of concerns from the community at the Open House, especially about the plans to expand the Ekati Diamond Mine. The community has concerns about the Jay-Cardinal Project, including the large size of the footprint, the impacts and how Traditional Knowledge will be used. The Yellowknives Dene are aware of archaeological sites and ancient camps and grave sites in the area and want them to be protected.

Yellowknives Dene are also concerned about the amount of traffic that the expansion will generate. It is not clear how the road traffic will be managed to allow for the wildlife, especially caribou, to cross the haul roads and how dust will be controlled.

Financial security of the mine was also discussed. The main concern being that the current amount that is set is not enough to carry out the approved reclamation plan.
