

- Mandate to facilitate discussions on issues related to environmental management at EKATI






#### **IEMA's Reclamation Interests**


 Responsibility to oversee Environmental Agreement and water licence including reclamation requirements

#### **IEMA's Reclamation Interests**

- IEMA has suggested better reclamation planning for EKATI through discussions amongst regulators, BHPB and communities
- Workshop a good opportunity to look at reclamation issues





## Background

- NWT has a history of mine closures
- DIAND has been remediating old mines
- Estimated Costs (at 2005)
  - Colomac \$70M
  - Giant \$300M
  - Port Radium \$15M




Colomac Mine site, 1997

# Today

- Reclamation issues are considered before a project is approved
- Security deposits are required
- Water licences require mines to look at the components, determine how each one will be closed and how the success of the closure is measured
- Successful use of Environmental Agreements and independent monitoring

## Legislation

- No uniform Canadian mine reclamation legislation, regulations or guidelines
- DIAND is working on guidelines to accompany the reclamation policy



## Workshop Purpose

- Develop a common understanding:
  - of the terms used in mine reclamation
  - of the issues, priorities and challenges that industry, government, and Aboriginal Peoples face with mine reclamation
